HIGHLIGHTS/SITUATION UPDATE (30/07/2020)

- Today (30/07/2020), 2 recoveries have been recorded; Zambezi (1) and Hardap (1).
- To-date, 37 Health Care Workers have tested positive for COVID-19.
- Cumulatively, 2058 (96.6%) cases are local transmissions while 71 (3.3%) are imported.
- There is evidence of a clustered community transmission in Erongo region (Table 1)
- Up to 1280 confirmed cases in Erongo region are still to be placed in isolation facilities.
- More male cases 1238(58.1%) were recorded compared to female cases 891 (41.9%).

- The country is in Stage 4 of the State of Emergency (29 June 2020 -17 September 2020)
- Walvis Bay, Swakopmund, and Arandis Local Authority Areas in Erongo region's Stage 3 is extended (from 04 August 2020 until 23h59 of 31 August 2020).

Twelve (12) of the 14 regions have reported confirmed cases; with Erongo reporting the highest 1940 (91.1%) followed by Khomas 107 (5.0%).




Figure 1: Distribution of suspected and confirmed COVID-19 cases in Namibia by District, 30 July 2020




Figure 2: Age and sex distribution of COVID-19 confirmed cases, 30 July 2020

- To date, 26765 tests have been conducted by NIP & Path-Care laboratories (including 2624 retests).
- Since the beginning of the outbreak, 5430 contacts of confirmed cases have been identified, 271 new contacts were identified within the last 24 hours.
- Cumulatively, 1565 contacts have completed their 14 days of follow up, while 1302 out of 3548 active contacts were monitored today.
- The most affected ages are within 20 and 49 years 1647 (77.4%).
- Those aged 60 and above constitute 57
 (2.7%) of those affected.




Figure 3: Epi-curve for confirmed COVID-19 cases 30 July 2020

- Namibia has recorded 2129 COVID-19 cases since 13 March 2020. Up to 534 (25.1%) of the total cases were recorded during week 29 (Figure 3).
- A high number of cases were recorded in the past three weeks as a result of:
 - -Spread of local transmission in Walvis Bay district
 - -Enhanced Active Case Search and testing, averaging 300 tests daily in the past weeks.
- Call centre continues operation for 24 hours daily. Today, 1190 calls were answered including 28 alerts.

PUBLIC HEALTH ACTION

- National level continues to support the regions
- Regions have enhanced social mobilization on COVID-19
- Targeted testing in Walvis Bay is ongoing
- Regions have intensified surveillance on travellers from high risk areas for early case detection

CHALLENGES

- Inadequate Human resources in the regions
- Inadequate ICU facilities and ICU equipment at referral hospitals and high care units in the districts.
- Inadequate isolation units, at health facilities in the regions.
- O Inadequate PPE
- Inadequate nasopharyngeal swabs and appropriate transport media.
- Prolonged turn-around time of results at NIP.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- The Ministry to fast track the appointment of critical positions for the response in the regions
- Provision of fully equipped ICU facilities in the regions.
- Establish fully equipped isolation units at health facilities in the regions.
- O Logistics pillar to continue with the procurement and distribution of sufficient PPE to the regions to ensure that response is not interrupted.
- NIP to continue sourcing for swabs and appropriate transport media.
