HIGHLIGHTS/SITUATION UPDATE (05/08/2020)

- The country is in Stage 4 of the State of Emergency (4 August 2020 -17 September 2020)
- ➤ Walvis Bay, Swakopmund, and Arandis Local Authority Areas in Erongo region's Stage 3 is extended (from 04 August 2020 until 23h59 of 31 August 2020).

 Thirteen (13) of the 14 regions have reported confirmed cases; with Erongo reporting the highest 2315 (87.3%) followed by Khomas 223 (8.4%).

- Kavango West region has confirmed its first case today (05/08/2020).
- Today (05/08/2020), 7 recoveries have been recorded from Ohangwena (1), and Khomas (6) regions.
- ➤ To-date, 48 Health Care Workers have tested positive for COVID-19.
- > Cumulatively, 2577 (97.2%) cases are local transmissions while 75 (2.8%) are imported.
- > There is evidence of a clustered community transmission in Erongo region (Table 1)
- Up to 1596 confirmed cases in Erongo region are still to be placed in isolation facilities.
- > More male cases 1557 (58.7%) were recorded compared to female cases 1095 (41.3%).

EPIDEMIOLOGICAL SITUATION IN NAMIBIA

- To date, 29637 tests have been conducted by NIP & Path-Care laboratories (including 2902 re-tests).
- > Since the beginning of the outbreak, 5926 contacts of confirmed cases have been identified, 115 new contacts were identified within the last 24 hours.
- Cumulatively, 2093 contacts have completed their 14 days of follow up, while 840 out of 3497 active contacts were monitored today.
- The most affected ages are within 20 and 49 years 2033 (76.7%).
- Those aged 60 and above constitute 75 (2.8%) of those affected.




Figure 1: Age and sex distribution of COVID-19 confirmed cases, 05 August 2020





Figure 2: Distribution of suspected and confirmed COVID-19 cases in Namibia by District, 05 August 2020

05 August 2020

Namibia has recorded 2652 COVID-19 cases since 13 March 2020. Up to 719 (27.1%) of the total cases were recorded during week 31 (Figure 3).

- A high number of cases were recorded in the past four weeks as a result of:
 - -Spread of local transmission in Walvis Bay district
 - -Enhanced Active Case Search and testing, averaging 600 tests daily in the past weeks.
- Call center continues operation for 24 hours daily. Today, 1050 calls were answered including 16 alerts.

- A total of 301 trucks entered the country through various ground crossing points in the last 24 hours.
- Of these trucks. 44.2% were heading to Khomas, 21.6% to //Kharas while 15.9% were heading Erongo region.

PUBLIC HEALTH ACTION

- > National level continues to support the regions
- Regions have enhanced social mobilization on COVID-19
- > Targeted testing in Walvis Bay and Karasburg is ongoing
- > Regions have intensified surveillance on travellers from high risk areas for early case detection

CHALLENGES

- > Inadequate Human resources in the regions
- ➤ Inadequate ICU facilities and ICU equipment at referral hospitals and high care units in the districts.
- > Inadequate isolation units, at health facilities in the regions.
- > Inadequate PPE
- > Inadequate nasopharyngeal swabs and appropriate transport media.
- Prolonged turn-around time of results at NIP.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- > The Ministry to fast track the appointment of critical positions for the response in the regions
- > Provision of fully equipped ICU facilities at referral hospitals and high care units in the districts.
- > Establish fully equipped isolation units at health facilities in the regions.
- > Logistics pillar to continue with the procurement and distribution of sufficient PPE to the regions to ensure that response is not interrupted.
- > NIP to continue sourcing for swabs and appropriate transport media.
- > Enhance laboratory testing capacity throughout the country.
