## HIGHLIGHTS/SITUATION UPDATE (21/10/2020)

- A total of 12460 cases have been recorded in a population of approximately 2.5 Million people, making it about 0.5% of the population infected.
- More male cases 6809 (54.6%) were recorded compared to female cases 5651 (45.4%).
- Of the total confirmed cases, 513 (4.1%) Health Care Workers (HCWs) have tested positive for COVID-19 todate.
  - -332 (64.7%) State; 178 (34.7%) Private, 3 (0.6%) NGO -280 (54.6%) recoveries including 3 (0.6%) deaths.
- All fourteen (14) regions have reported confirmed cases; Khomas and Erongo regions reported the highest with 5732 (46.0%) and 3917 (31.4%) respectively.
- Of the total fatalities, 104 (78.2%) are COVID-19 deaths while 29 (21.8%) are COVID-19 related deaths.
- The cases continue to flare up among closed settings such as school premises and hostels, police holding cells, and prisons.
- Today (21/10/2020), 22 recoveries have been recorded from Khomas region; the recovery rate now stands at 85.1%.

- To date, 118458 tests (including (6081 re-tests) have been conducted by NIP, Path-Care, NAMDEB, UNAM and Namib Poultry laboratories.
- Since the beginning of the outbreak, 30005 contacts of confirmed cases have been identified, 395 new contacts were identified within the last 24 hours from 9 regions.
- Cumulatively, 22556 contacts have completed their monitoring period, while a total of 3035 (24.4%) contacts of confirmed cases have tested positive.
- Today, 6389 (83.7%) out of 7631 active contacts were monitored.





Figure 1: Distribution of suspected and confirmed COVID-19 cases by District, 21 October 2020

- A total of 209 trucks entered the country through various ground crossing points in the last 24 hours.
- Of these trucks, 112 (53.6%) were heading to Khomas, 44 (21.1%) to //Kharas while 23 (11.0%) were heading to Erongo region.
- > The remaining 30 (14.3%) were heading to the other 8 regions.



A highest peak of 2123 (17.0%) cases was recorded during week 34 (Figure 2).

- After a peak in epi-week 34, the country has seen a gradual reduction in the average number of confirmed cases to 51 in epi-week 42.
- The National Call center continues operation for 24 hours daily.

Today (21/10/2020), 808 calls were answered including 109 alerts.

- Since March 2020, 17846 people have been placed into mandatory quarantine facilities around the country.
  - A total of **1144**people are currently
    in quarantine, with **115** new admissions
    in the last 24 hours.




Figure 3: Age and Sex distribution of COVID-19 confirmed cases. As of 21 October 2020

- Of the total confirmed cases, 8849 (71.0%) are in the 20-49 years age-brackets which constitutes the majority of the recorded cases.
- The under 5 years age group make up 303 (2.4%) of the total cases whereas, 565 (4.5%) are above 60 years of age.
- A total of **1484 (11.9%)** of the confirmed cases are among the 5-19 years category.

# PUBLIC HEALTH ACTION(S)

- > Training on Case management and IPC for healthcare workers is ongoing with support from the Robert Koch Institute (RKI).
- Training on Integrated Disease Surveillance Response (IDSR) is ongoing country-wide.
- Public awareness on COVID-19 prevention measures is ongoing.
- > The government and developmental partners continue to prioritise continuation of essential health services

### CHALLENGES

- Lack of isolation units and facilities in the country for special cases in closed settings such as police holding cells, prisons and school hostels.
- Inadequate ICU facilities and ICU equipment at referral hospitals and high care units in the districts.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

- Establish fully equipped isolation units and facilities for identified special cases throughout the country.
- Provision of fully equipped ICU facilities at referral hospitals and high care units in the districts.
