HIGHLIGHTS/SITUATION UPDATE (17/01/2021)

- ➤ A total of 30753 cases have been recorded to-date, representing 1% of the population.
- More male cases 15582 (51%) were recorded compared to female cases 15171 (49%).
- Of the total confirmed cases, 1463 (5%) Health Workers (HWs) have tested positive for COVID-19 todate.
 - 1110 (76%) State; 349 (24%) Private, 4 (0.3%) Non-Governmental Organizations.
 - 1238 (85%) recoveries and 6 (0.4%) deaths.
- The recovery rate now stands at 89%.
- All fourteen (14) regions have reported confirmed cases; Khomas and Erongo regions reported the highest with 13624 (44%) and 6526 (21%) respectively.
- Of the total fatalities, 240 (82%) are COVID-19 deaths while 53 (18%) are COVID-19 related deaths.

- To date, 240476 tests (including 10853 re-tests) have been conducted by NIP, Path-Care, NAMDEB, UNAM, Namib Poultry and Central Veterinary laboratories.
- Since the beginning of the outbreak, 55883 contacts of confirmed cases have been identified, 238 new contacts were identified within the last 24 hours from 13 regions.
- Cumulatively, 49105 contacts have completed their monitoring period, while a total of 6712 (22%) contacts of confirmed cases have tested positive.
- Today, 4377 (67%) out of 6517 active contacts monitored.

A highest peak of 3485 (11%) cases was recorded during week 54 (Figure 1).




Figure 2: Age and Sex distribution of COVID-19 confirmed cases, as of 17 January 2021






Figure 1: Epi-curve for confirmed COVID-19 cases
As of 17 January 2021

- Of the total confirmed cases, 21297 (69%) are in the 20-49 years age-brackets which constitutes the majority of the recorded cases.
- A total of 3571 (12%) of the confirmed cases are among the 5-19 years category.
- The under 5 years age group make 705 (2%) of the total cases whereas, 1928 (6%) are above 60 years

- A total of 2159 people are currently in quarantine, with 263 new admissions.

- Continue to give awareness on the importance of adhering to COVID -19 prevention measures; with the involvement of the Security Cluster.
