- A total of 47383 cases have been recorded to-date, representing 2% of the population.
- Cases are equally distributed by gender at 50%.
- Of the total confirmed cases, 2039 (4%) are Health Workers.
 - 1606 (79%) State; 429 (21%) Private, 4 (0.2%) Non-Governmental Organizations.
 - 2005 (98%) recoveries and 6 (0.3%) deaths.
- > The recovery rate now stands at 96%.
- All fourteen (14) regions have reported confirmed cases; Khomas and Erongo regions reported the highest with 16940 (36%) and 8471 (18%) respectively.
- Of the total fatalities, 507 (81%) are COVID-19 deaths while 115 (19%) are COVID-19 related deaths.

- Since March 2020, 44435 people have been placed into mandatory quarantine facilities around the country.
- A total of 1346 people are currently in quarantine, with 162 new admissions.

- Of the total confirmed cases, 29919 (63%) are in the 20-49 years age-brackets which constitutes the majority of the recorded cases.
- A total of 8337 (18%) of the confirmed cases are among the 5-19 years category.
- The under 5 years age group make up 1087 (2%) of the total cases whereas, 3087 (7%) are above 60 years of age.




Figure 1: Age and Sex distribution of COVID-19 confirmed cases

- To date, 374759 tests (including 11891 re-tests) have been conducted by NIP, Path-Care, NAMDEB, UNAM, Namib Poultry, Diagno, NAMPath, Namibia Central Pathology and Central Veterinary laboratories
- Since the beginning of the outbreak, 86778 contacts of confirmed cases have been identified,
 496 new contacts were identified within the last 24 hours from 11 regions.
- Cumulatively, 82221 contacts have completed their monitoring period, while a total of 11799 (25%) contacts of confirmed cases have tested positive.
- Today, 2665 (71%) out of 3739 active contacts monitored.





Figure 2: Epi-curve for confirmed COVID-19 cases, 22 April 2021

- The highest peaks of 3463 (7%) and 3485 (7%) cases were recorded during week 53 of 2020 and 1 of 2021 respectively (Figure 2).
- The National Call Center continues operations for 24 hours daily.
- Today (22/04/2021), 524 calls were answered including 21 alerts.

Cumulative_confirmed cases per 100 000 people




Figure 3: Distribution of cumulative confirmed cases per 100 000 by region, 22 April 2021

- Non-adherence to COVID-19 prevention measures by the general public.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Establish fully equipped isolation units and facilities for cases detected in schools and police holding cells.
- Continue to give awareness on the importance of adhering to COVID -19 prevention measures; with the involvement of the Security Cluster.
