

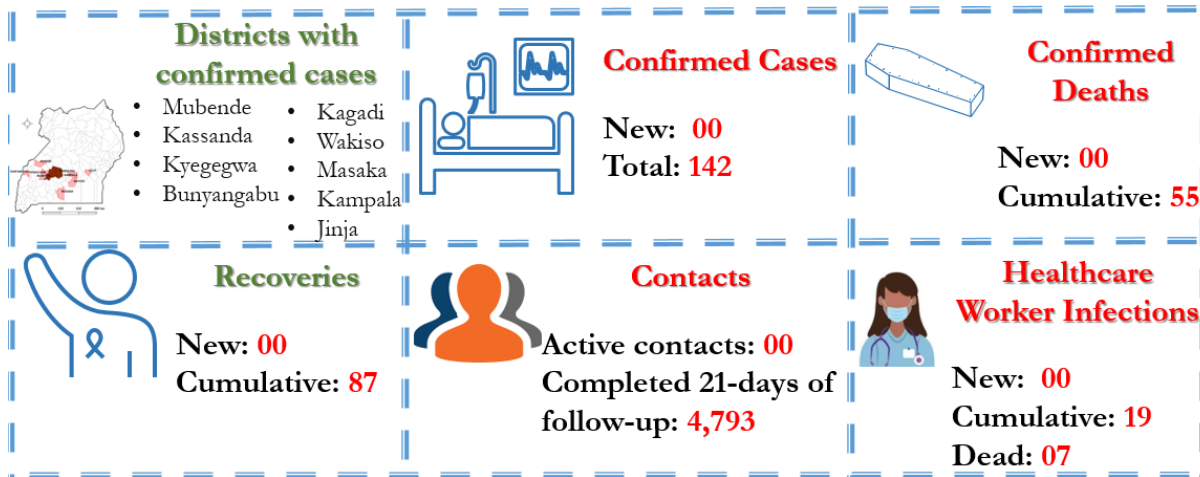

Data update as of 27th December 2022 at 22 :00 HRS



Background

On 20th September 2022, the Ministry of Health declared an outbreak of Sudan Ebola Virus (SVD) after a case managed at Mubende Regional Referral Hospital (MRRH) in Mubende district was confirmed through testing at the Uganda Virus Research Institute (UVRI). This followed investigations by the National Rapid Response Team of suspicious deaths that had occurred in the district earlier in the month. This is the first time in more than a decade that Uganda reports an outbreak of Sudan ebolavirus

Key Highlights

Today marks 102 days of responding to the EVD outbreak and 30 days since the last confirmed case.

- ➔ Within the past 24 hours, there was no new confirmed case or death registered; there was no recovery.
- ➔ Case Fatality Ratio (CFR) among confirmed cases still stands 55/142 (39%).
- ➔ No active contacts are currently under follow-up.

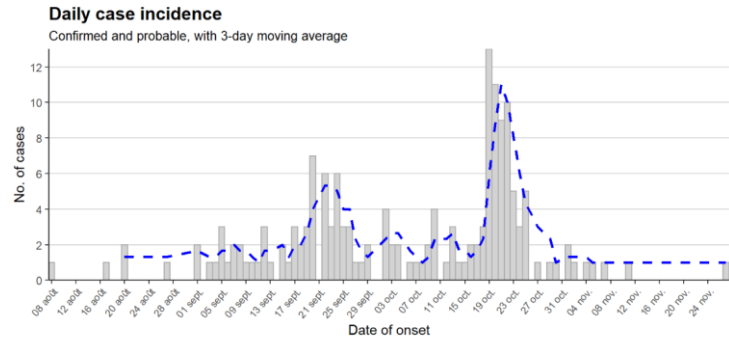


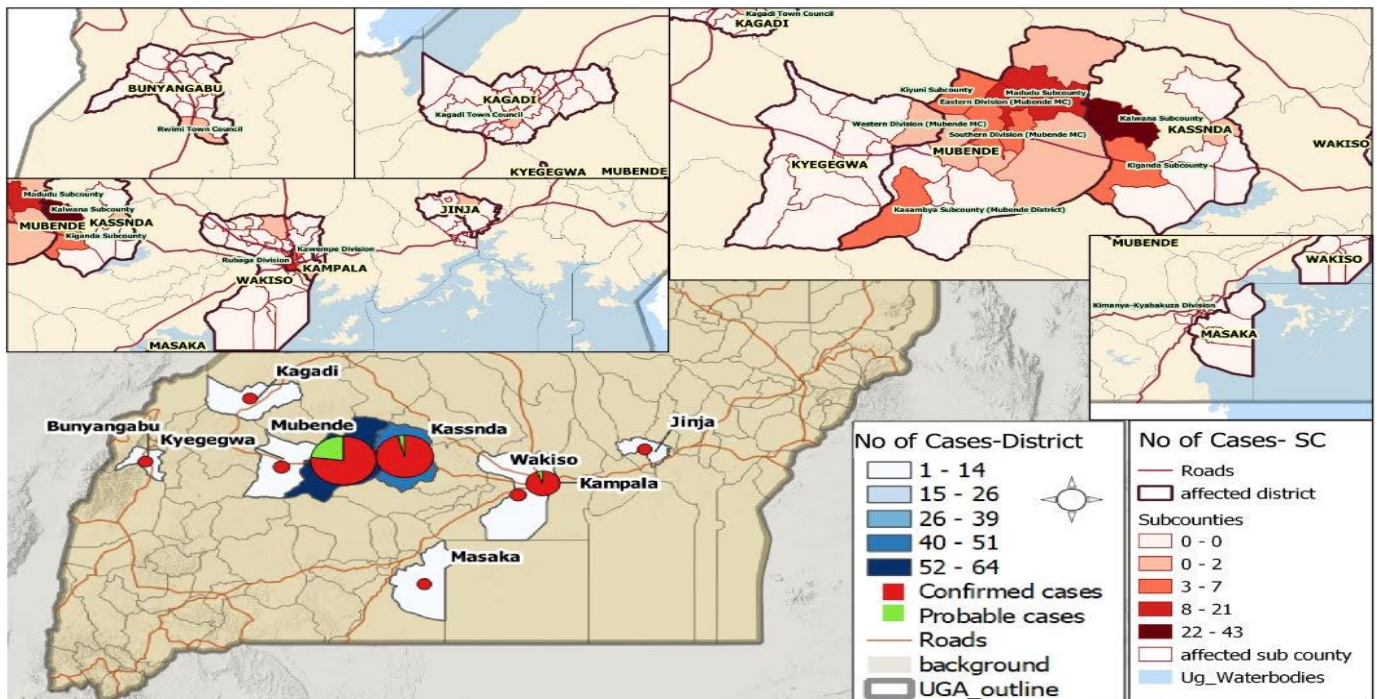
Figure: Time analysis of affected individuals

<i>Social Mobilisation & Stakeholder Engagement</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Team Masaka issued 750 EVD posters, 30 flip charts and 200 FAQs. ➤ KCCA distributed 100 EVD booklets of FAQs, 1,000 leaflets, and 100 EVD posters. ➤ Team Jinja distributed 110 EVD Materials after sensitization of Boda-boda riders & saloon operators from Bubugo Village in Butagaya Subcounty. ➤ Team Kassanda addressed church congregations in three different places of worship and disseminated basic facts on EVD prevention and control measures, roles and responsibilities of community members in the fight against Ebola, and not to stigmatize survivors; 850 Christians were reached. ➤ Team Kassanda also held community dialogues with various groups that included: community members, cultural leaders and sub county task forces, and Local Councils in Myanzi and Kijuna sub-counties, reaching 158 people with EVD messages. ➤ KCCA engaged passengers, drivers and touts at the New Taxi Park and Namayiba Bus Park in Central Division, Kampala. ➤ Team Lyantonde engaged 15 commercial sex workers and 17 traditional healers on EVD preparedness. ➤ Team Jinja re-orientated village task force (VTF) members from 42 villages in Buwenge Town council and Namagera Town council reaching 126 people.
<i>Mental Health & Psychosocial Social Support</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ SURVIVOR FOLLOW-UP: Six survivors were visited; all male clients were encouraged to adhere to consistent use of condoms. Four families of EVD victims were visited and followed up.

Key messages to the public

- People in the community should call an alert hotline or go to a health facility if they have symptoms (e.g., fever, headache, weakness, vomiting, bloody diarrhoea or urine, bleeding from body openings).
