



THE FOUR PRIORITY AREAS IDENTIFIED UNDER THE CCS:

Strengthen health systems to ensure universal access to quality Reproductive maternal, newborn, child and adolescent health (RMNCAH) and other essential health services.

Reduce/control exposure of individuals to risk factors that threaten their health and well-being.

Protect communities against emergencies of infectious diseases and other public health events. Improve efficiencies in the health sector through better, equitable health governance, leadership and accountability.















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
