




Reinforcing outbreak response systems to curb mpox in Uganda



Uganda's proactive response to the mpox outbreak has been pivotal in controlling the spread of the virus. With 51 confirmed cases reported across 11 districts as of October 2, 2024, health authorities have strengthened measures like surveillance, testing, and public awareness campaigns. WHO supported with training, resources, and data systems for effective contact tracing.

Risk communication efforts have engaged communities, disseminated educational materials, and reduced stigma. Survivors like Godwin Asimwe and Esther Kisakye emphasize the importance of hygiene and early medical intervention. As of now, more than 800 samples have been tested, and advanced digital tools have improved case management.



Tools like GoData improved tracking for 263 contacts. Community outreach and survivor stories highlight prevention, stigma reduction, and resilience.

More than 6.5 million children were vaccinated in a successful synchronized polio campaign between Kenya and Uganda. This cross-border achievement began with a coordinated launch in Bungoma District, Kenya, and Mbale District, Uganda.

This collaboration serves as a model for other countries facing similar challenges. By continuing to prioritize cross-border vaccination synchronization, Kenya, Uganda, and their health partners are leading the way toward a polio-free future for all.

By conducting these campaigns on the same dates, sharing real-time information, both countries ensured that children under five in these vulnerable areas were reached effectively, reducing the chance of cross-border virus transmission. cing similar challenges. WHO, partners tip over 200 Journalists in Uganda on Mpox and Marburg

Uganda's Ministry of Health (MOH), World Health Organization (WHO), United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) in collaboration with the African Centre for Media Excellence (ACME) oriented over 200 journalists countrywide on the mpox outbreak and preparedness for a possible Marburg outbreak.

The orientation was conducted in different batches over a three-week period targeting reporters and editors at national and regional levels.

While mpox remains a significant public health concern in Uganda, the country has made significant strides in responding to the outbreak. WHO, with support from partners like the United States Agency for International Development (USAID), is working diligently to strengthen the different response pillars; coordination, surveillance, laboratory diagnostics, case management, risk communication and community engagement countrywide. Empowering youth to combat tobacco in Uganda: Building champions amongst university student leaders to take charge

As part of a broader strategy to protect young Ugandans from the dangers of New and Emerging Nicotine and Tobacco Products (NENTPs), the Ministry of Health (MoH), supported by the World Health Organization (WHO), held a 2 day groundbreaking workshop in Kampala bringing together student leaders from seven Universities in Uganda to discuss the enforcement of Uganda's Tobacco Control Act 2015, control of tobacco-related harm & its control which includes a ban on NENTPs. This workshop, which marked the start of a long-term anti-tobacco campaign, aimed to sensitize university student leaders/champions with the knowledge and skills to counteract the aggressive marketing tactics of the tobacco industry, especially its focus on targeting youth through social media platforms

Universities play a pivotal role in shaping the minds and attitudes of young people, and the Ministry of Health's decision to engage student leaders is strategic. 27 student leaders from universities like Makerere, Kyambogo, Nkumba, Islamic University in Uganda, Cavendish, and Kampala International University were trained to become champions of tobacco control.

As Uganda strengthens its efforts to curb tobacco use, the involvement of student leaders is seen as a critical component of ensuring long-term success. The Ministry of Health, in collaboration with WHO, will continue to support these student champions as they embark on their anti-tobacco campaigns. The hope is that this initiative will not only reduce the prevalence of tobacco use among young people but also inspire other African nations to follow suit. More info

Ministry of Health is rolling out a comprehensive Electronic Medical Record system in a phased approach to all health facilities across the country starting with National Referral hospitals down to high volume Health centre IIIs.," Dr Diana Atwine,

The Ugandan Ministry of Health has today received brand new Information Technology (IT) Equipment worth USD 222,594 (equivalent to UGX 865,029,221) to support the Ministry of Health (MoH) in the ongoing digitization of health service delivery and the scale-up of Electronic Medical Records (EMR) system across all public health facilities.

The IT equipment, comprising 95 laptops and 130 scanners, was donated by the Federal Republic of Germany, through World Health Organization (WHO), as part of their partnership to improve universal health coverage. The equipment will be channeled to the National Referral Hospital, selected Regional Referrals, and General hospitals.

Information technology is appreciated for being a vehicle for improving medical supplies accountability, the quality of health care as well as continuity of care based on a transferable medical record. More details

Ministry of Health, WHO and KOICA to Refurbish 28 Health Facilities in Busoga Sub-Region

The Ministry of Health (MoH) and the World Health Organization (WHO) launched a refurbishment of 28 health facilities in Uganda's Busoga sub-region. This initiative, which is a crucial step in service delivery is with the financial backing of the Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA).

The refurbishment is part of a five-year project titled Health System Strengthening for Improving Reproductive, Maternal, Neonatal, Child, and Adolescent Health (RMNCAH) Service Delivery in the Busoga Sub-Region. The refurbishment efforts focus on critical areas such as maternity and children's wards, outpatient departments, expanding existing laboratories, and enhancing antenatal care clinics. Additionally, a new rainwater harvesting system will be installed at all refurbished health facilities. Selected facilities will receive a motorized water system to further manage water stress within the facilities.

By December 2024, the RMNCAH project is expected to have a profound impact, benefiting 560,809 pregnant women, 499,852 newborns, 349,327 school-aged adolescents (10–19 years), and 687 teachers across both primary and secondary schools in the Busoga subregion. However, more pregnant women, newborns and adolescent girls are expected to continue benefiting from this investment.

Since its inception, the project has made remarkable progress. 100 lives are saved monthly through emergency referrals facilitated by seven Type B Toyota Land Cruiser ambulances procured for the region by KOICA and WHO. <u>More infe</u>

This refurbishment is a pivotal part of our ongoing efforts to ensure that every individual in the Busoga sub-region has access to quality healthcare, thereby reducing preventable maternal and newborn deaths," says Dr Richard Mugahi Comissioner MoH.

WHO donates kits to support mpox diagnostics in Uganda

The Ugandan Ministry of Healthy received mpox sample collection kits worth USD 15,135 (equivalent to UgX 56 million) to support accurate and timely diagnostic testing, which is critical in controlling the spread of mpox in the country.

The sample collection kits, comprised 5,000 swabs with transport medium and 5,000 dry Dacron/polyester flocked swabs.

The kits were procured with generous funding from the Federal Republic of Germany through the WHO Contingency Fund for Emergencies as part of support to the mpox outbreak response in Uganda. The kits will be used by districts and healthcare facilities across the country to collect samples from suspected mpox cases and channel them to the Uganda Virus Research Institute for testing.

We encourage the Ministry and all healthcare facilities receiving these kits to put them to immediate use in the field as we work together to mitigate the spread of mpox and protect the health and wellbeing of Ugandans." Dr Charles Njuguna, WHO Rep.

On 24 July 2024, Uganda confirmed two cases of mpox in Kasese district and subsequently declared an outbreak on 2 August 2024. As of 23 September 2024, a total of 25 cumulative confirmed cases had been reported across the districts of Kampala, Wakiso, Kasese, Mayuge, Amuru, Nakaseke, Kagadi, Nakasongola, Adjumani and Mukono. The event took place amidst growing discourse on health workforce financing as a cornerstone of achieving Universal Health Coverage (UHC).

Despite significant strides, Uganda continues to face challenges in addressing critical health worker shortages, particularly in rural and underserved areas. According to WHO's latest findings, Uganda's health workforce density stands at 25.9 health workers per 10,000 people, significantly below the 44.5 required to meet UHC targets.

Dr Charles Njuguna, WHO Representative to Uganda, pledged ongoing collaboration with the Ministry of Health and other partners.

Our partnership with Uganda remains steadfast. Together, we will continue advancing innovative solutions to overcome health challenges and create lasting impact.," he said.

The Government of Uganda through Ministry of Health (MOH) has recognised Dr Annet Kisakye, the World Health Organization (WHO) National Professional Officer (Routine Immunization) for her outstanding contributions to improving immunization services in Uganda.

The award was presented to Dr Kisakye by Dr Sania Nishtar, Chief Executive Officer of Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance on 19 November 2024 in Kampala. This was during the celebration of 50 years of Uganda's Expanded Program on Immunization (EPI).

With over 15 years of experience at WHO, Dr Kisakye has provided technical guidance and support to MOH in several areas including strengthening routine immunization, introducing new vaccines, the polio eradication initiative, eliminating measles, strengthening surveillance, eliminating maternal and neonatal tetanus including outbreak and pandemic response activities among others. Her work has directly contributed to preventing disease outbreaks and saving lives through vaccination in the country.

Dr Kisakye played a pivotal role in a campaign to save lives against Cholera infection when the country started vaccinating the people living in 13 hotspot districts as part of the national integrated comprehensive cholera prevention and control plan 2017/18-2021/22. Since then, no outbreaks have been registered in those districts. This recognition is a testament to the collective efforts of many dedicated individuals, partners, and communities committed to improving public health. She feels inspired to continue striving for a healthier future for all Ugandans, especially in this era where vaccine hesitancy—a well-known global threat—is contributing to the resurgence of vaccine-preventable diseases such as measles. " said Dr Kisakye.

Participants shared their positive experiences and commitment to integrating these practices into their work and personal lives. The session reaffirmed meditation as a powerful tool for stress relief and overall health.






WHO Deputy Executive Director visits Uganda for Mpox response
